

Charley Rappaport

Domra Choir Workshop

Born in Brooklyn, New York, **Charley Rappaport** began playing in college concert halls and coffeehouses in the early '60s. Early on he perfected his own style of performance of Gypsy music as leader of a number of groups - most recently **The Great American Gypsies** with Joseph Kovach and **Mistral**, with Dean Shumaker. He is also music director of **The Gordon Neidinger Trio** and plays guitar in that group. Charley has appeared as a soloist in New York's Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center and Town Hall, in Washington's Kennedy Center and in many other important venues in North America and Europe. He has 5 recordings to his credit, the latest being **Before I Had a Red Tomato** on Caravan Recordings.

In 1978 he co-founded *The Balalaika and Domra Association of America (BDAA)*, an international organization to preserve and proliferate Russian folk music and Russian folk instruments. In 1975 he founded the *Houston Balalaika Society*, in 1981 he founded the *Atlanta Balalaika Society* and in 1994 he co-founded the *Atlanta Mandolin Society*, all still thriving orchestras.

In 2003 he was the subject of the cover story of *Mandolin Magazine*, a national publication. In 2004 he was named a *Master Folk Artist* by the *Pennsylvania Council for the Arts*, and awarded a grant in conjunction with their Master/Apprentice program. In October of 2006 he assumed the posts of Executive and Music Director of the *Pittsburgh Mandolin Society* and he is conductor of the *Pittsburgh Mandolin Orchestra*. He has been teaching fretted instruments privately both in Pittsburgh and in Albion, PA since 2003.
